INTENT:	
What do you want your subject to look like at Stephen's?	At St Stephens, Art and Design is taught every term, alternating with Design and Technology, although the skills taught in Art and Design can also be found across a variety of subjects through cross curricular teaching and learning. At St Stephen's, we encourage children's artistic development from EYFS through to Year 6. We look for cross-curricular links with other subjects to embed children's learning further. The Art and Design curriculum has been designed to actively engage and stimulate children's natural creativity whilst developing a range of high-quality skills in drawing, painting and sculpture. This leads children to become competent and confident in these skills. Children are appropriately challenged and supported to ensure they reach their full potential within the arts. Teachers can also use the 'Kapow primary' planning and CPD online resource to support teaching and learning further.

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During the planning process, Artists, Designers and craft makers to study are chosen carefully to reflect the diversity. Pupils have the opportunity to express themselves and their individual ideas through Art and Design teaching and learning. Artwork is also shared within our school community via our social media platforms, twitter and on our school website via a virtual Art club.	
Within Art and Design, lessons are taught practically and encourage pupils to be experimental. Pupils use sketchbooks to explore their thoughts and ideas, before deciding on their final artwork piece. Differentiation is provided where needed to ensure that lessons are accessible for all learners.	
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'Kapow Primary' online resource is also used to demonstrate high quality art techniques to pupils and also to upskill teacher's subject knowledge and confidence in teaching art and design.	
 Within Art and design, teachers and learners have the opportunity to access kapow primary online resource. This gives teachers confidence within the subject and enables high quality teaching and learning across the subject. There are opportunities for pupils to review previous learning within their sketchbooks and build on these skills within further learning. 	
Learning is evidenced within annotated sketch books and through final art work pieces. Teachers give oral feedback within lessons and through marking and feedback within sketchbooks and through our marking and feedback policy.	



How is key vocabulary taught and understood in your subject?	Teachers use kapow primary to improve vocabulary within Art and design. Children learn key words for art applications throughout each subject taught.

What monitoring exercises do you as a subject leader complete regularly to quality assess the subject?	 The impact of Art and Design teaching and learning at St Stephens can be monitored through formative and summative assessment opportunities. At the end of each key stage, pupils will be well equipped with a range of art techniques and the confidence to reflect on their creative works of art. Their skills will include: Produce creative work, exploring and recording their ideas and experiences Be proficient in a range of art and design techniques including, drawing, painting and sculpture Evaluate and analyse creative works of art, using subject specific language Have knowledge of great artists and the historical and cultural development of their art Meet the intended outcomes for each key stage outlined by the National curriculum for Art and Design
How do you identify which children are working at the expected standard and those who need further support?	Pupils show their overall outcomes and progression in Art and Design through their annotated sketchbooks, final artworks and evaluations. Teachers evaluate lessons and plan for progression through assessment, marking and feedback.
What are the strengths you found in your subject after your investigations?	Strengths in Art and Design at St Stephen's include pupils excitement and engagement in learning about the subject. This has been identified through pupil and staff voice questionnaires.



What are the next steps for your subject across the school generally that you have identified?	 Next steps for art and design at St Stephen's include: To continue to upskill and guide staff to develop Art & Design teaching and learning, including the use of key vocabulary To introduce 'Arts Award' and develop across key stages
